Explanation: In many cultures, the first monsoon rain is seen as a sign of renewal and good fortune. Arjun's mother is reassuring him with this belief.

7. What is the tone of the passage?

Answer: A) It represents the burdens of the universe Explanation: This phrase conveys the idea that stars, despite their beauty and brilliance, bear unseen burdens or struggles. The weight of their glow implies that beauty often comes at a cost, which is carried silently and invisibly.

11. How does the speaker feel about the stars?

Answer: B) They feel a sense of awe and melancholy Explanation: The speaker is both in awe of the stars' beauty ("They shine for us, they burn so bright") and melancholic about their fading nature ("But inside they are fading from sight"). This mix of admiration and sadness reflects the poem's emotional depth.

12. What is the function of the line "Every dot a rhythm, every line a rhyme"?

Answer: C) It compares the stars to a poem or song Explanation: This line uses metaphor to compare the stars

to elements of a poem or song, emphasizing the harmony and rhythm of the universe. The imagery suggests that the sky is not just a random collection of stars but a carefully composed work of art.

13. How does the poet convey the theme of impermanence?

Explanation: The poem repeatedly mentions the fading of stars and the cost of their beauty. Phrases like "But inside they are fading from sight" highlight the theme of impermanence, suggesting that all things, even the brightest stars, eventually diminish or disappear.

Answer: B) The rhyme and rhythm create a sense of harmony

Explanation: The poem follows a rhythmic and rhyming structure, which mirrors the harmony of the universe and the stars. This structure contrasts with the theme of impermanence, as it offers a sense of order and beauty, even as the stars fade.
